8th MEETING OF INTERNATIONAL COMMITTEE

Due to professional commitments beyond his control Prof. Hauk could not preside at the beginning of this meeting. In the afternoon he rejoined this session. During his absence the Vice-President Dr. Tenney presided the meeting.

Prior to the first item of the submitted agenda the request for the admission of Yugoslavia was presented to the Committee. The letter of June 4, 1970, requesting it was read. The motion by Dr. Reti and seconded by Mr. Havercroft and others to have this country as a member was accepted by acclamation.

The Secretary, Dr. Schaper, then invited the delegates to join as members and introduce the Voting Member Dipl. Ing. Mitja Sipek and Dr. Ing. Seid Ferusic as the Non-Voting Member.

1. Approval of Minutes of the 7th Meeting

The draft of the minutes of the Seventh Meeting was read, respective corrections made and the final version unanimously approved. The respective motion was made by Mr. Havercroft and seconded by Mr. De Sterke.

2 and 4 Agreement on NDT Nomenclature and Discussion on the Term Nondestructive Testing

It was decided to combine 2 and 4.

An intense, educational and detailed discussion developed on tehcoordination between the International Committee and IIW, Commission V, and ISO TC/135.

A motion made by Mr. Lund read as follows:

Those members of the International Committee who will attend the July 1970 Assembly of IIW in Switzerland, and the ISO TC/135 in London in September 1970 are to submit the respective reports on the subject of nomenclature to the members of the International Committee not later than June1, 1971.

A second motion on this subject was made by Dr. Mullins, seconded by Dr. Pawlowski, and unanimously accepted. It read:

This Committee recommends that each national Delegate should influence the respective national Standards Organizations to ensure his country's representation on ISO TC/135.

5. Comments on Sixth International Conference

Dr. Tenney opened the discussion on this subject by expressing the tanks, congratualations and appreciation of the Board of Direcors of ASNT to the Host Society and its organizers for a very successful and impressive Sixth International Conference.

Similar statements were made by Mr. Havercroft, Mr. Evrard, Dr. Pawlowski, Dr. Mullins and Prof. Homes.

From the standpoint of constructive criticism many individual subjects

were brought up leading to the final conclusions that the procedures as implemented during this Conference seem to be satisfactory.

The limitation to 12 pages per written paper proved to be satisfactory. The availability of all papers in preprint form was appreciated. It was not desirable to send such preprints to the participants' home addresses in order to give the authors an opportunity to present the latest data on their subjects.

The availability of these publications at the Conference contributed to a better background information and discussion.

Having accepted such a large number of papers made it possible for many younger authors to take part in such an international conference and be exposed to this atmosphere. It thereby strengthened the profession and its future activities nationally and internationally.

6. Exhibition Arrangements

It was unanimously agreed that the technical exhibition has been the greatest and best organized in the history of nondestructive testing. The reports from many exhibitors reaching this Committee through Mr. Bates and other Delegates furthermore indicated that this enterprise was also worthwhile from the business point of view.

7. Activities between Conferences

It was especially mentioned by Dr. Konkoly that a more intense dissemination of information dealing with national and special International meetings between international conferences by made known. He suggested that the National Delegates be informed directly on suchforthcoming events.

Dr. Mullins suggested that such information should also be made available to the U.S. Delegate in order to use it in "Internationally Speaking" of Materials Evaluation. Dr. Tenney agreed to continue this phase of his activities.

Dr. Mullins asked that special thanks should be transmitted to all the workers who helped make this a successful conference.

Dr. Pawlowski extended his invitation again to meet in Poland 1973.
